First Baptist Church of Salina, Kansas, Receives 2019 George D. Younger Award

First Baptist Church, Salina, KS, received the 2019 George D. Younger Award for Excellence in Local or Regional American Baptist History from the American Baptist Historical Society. Rev. Dr. Kevin Hazelton, the church's pastor, accepted the award on behalf of the

congregation during the Historical Society's breakfast on June 23, part of the American Baptist Churches' Biennial Mission Summit held in Virginia Beach, Virginia. Mr. Dana R. Younger, son of George and Dodie Younger, made the presentation.

The Award was given in commendation of First Baptist Church's yearlong celebration of their sesquicentennial. Choosing the theme, "Faithfully Growing in Christ," the church celebrated their history of

ministry as well as focusing on ways to continue growing in Christ into the future. The weekend of June 2-3, 2018,

was the high point, with the opening of a time capsule;

American Baptist Churches of the Central Region, and the ABC/USA general secretary. General Secretary Rev. Dr. Lee Spitzer preached the anniversary sermon.

In addition to planning monthly events related to their anniversary, the church included informational bits in Sunday bulletins and designed a logo that was used throughout the yearlong celebration. Through the anniversary events they connected with the community in many diverse ways (an automobile show, an ecumenical music concert, children's events) and increased their involvement with and giving to ongoing ministries. Church members wore Tshirts bearing the anniversary logo at every anniversary function; Rev. Hazelton wore his T-

The example of Salina First Baptist Church serves as an encouragement, inspiration, and model to other congregations planning a celebration of ministry in their community.

A highlight of the anniversary celebration was opening the time capsule that had been sealed decades earlier.

George D. Younger Award

George D. Younger (1926-2001) was a historian, minister, ecumenical leader, and lifelong enthusiast for Baptist history. Along with his parish and regional ministry in New York City and New Jersey, he served as editor-in-chief of the Historical Society's journal, *Foundations* (predecessor to the *American Baptist Quarterly*), represented the Baptist World Alliance at the United Nations, and taught Baptist history and polity at Princeton Theological Seminary, New Brunswick Theological Seminary, Drew Theological School, and Union Theological Seminary.

Dr. Younger stressed the importance of Baptist history and principles. Seeking to honor his achievement and to continue his legacy of



encouraging others to share their own part in Baptist history, the Historical Society's Board of Managers created the George D. Younger Award in 2004. The next Younger Award will be presented during the 2021 Biennial Mission Summit in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Projects

Presidents' Bible signed

During the closing worship service of the ABC/USA Biennial Mission Summit, ABC/USA President Josué Gómez-Menendez added his signature to the historic Presidents' Bible. Given in 1951 to the first president of the American (no longer "Northern") Baptist Convention by the First Baptist Church of Washington, DC, this Bible has been signed by every subsequent ABC/USA president. The American Baptist Historical Society serves as steward of this historic Bible.

Digital Archives Update

With our new FlexView microfilm scanner — purchased with *At Your Fingertips* funds — we've converted the first 20 rolls of missionary correspondence to .pdf files. We have now begun to digitize ABHMS records that were microfilmed in the mid-20th century and had begun to degrade. Digitizing these records will preserve them for future generations.

The ABHS listing of nearly 7500 loose pamphlets in the collections has been uploaded to our online catalog. Though most of the pamphlets date from the 18th to 20th centuries, the collection also includes older works likes Andrew Ritor's *A Treatise on the Vanity of Childish-Baptisme* and *The Second Part of the Vanity and Childishnes of Infants Baptisme*, both published in 1642. Increasing accessibility to our historical library will start with the conversion of the card catalog to an online catalog. This will allow better searching of the more than 40,000 bound volumes, including many 16th- to 18th-century works. This lengthy cataloging project is in progress.

Research Snapshot — Judith Wellman

Judith Wellman is working with the Michigan Street Baptist Church in Buffalo, NY, on an application for placement on the National Register of Historical Places. Michigan Street is the second oldest Black church in Buffalo. Ms. Wellman looked through National Baptist Convention records, association and state convention minutes and other records for the history and activity of the church and its members.

It was gratifying to supply many of the records for which Ms. Wellman was looking. A video of Ms. Wellman can be found on our <u>YouTube</u> channel, along with videos of other researchers.

Celebrating the Successful Conclusion of the *At Your Fingertips* Campaign



From the Archives

New York Baptist City Society

Begun in 1893, the New York Baptist City Mission Society engaged in various ministries throughout the metropolitan New York City area. The Society enabled ministry and outreach by loaning funds, starting churches, and supporting programs. This was a time of great immigration to the US, and the Society founded many foreign language churches: Italian, German, Spanish, Hungarian, etc. The inner city tenements were not particularly healthy, so the Society started camps and a Fresh Air Society to bring children to a different environment. Tracts were printed to introduce city residents to Baptist beliefs. There was a Home for the Aged, and a Woman's Auxiliary.

It was renamed the New York City Baptist City Society in 1938 to highlight its concern for all aspects of church work in a modern metropolis. A parallel development had been the forming of a Brooklyn Baptist Church Extension Society in 1886; in 20 years its work was extended to Queens. The Extension Society, in time by mutual agreement, took over much of the work of the Long Island Baptist Association (founded in 1867) in Kings, Queens, Nassau and Suffolk counties. It was the formal merger of the Baptist City Mission Society and the Church Extension Society which brought about the formation of the American Baptist Churches of Metropolitan New York in 1972 under the leadership of Executive Secretary Angus Hull.
